



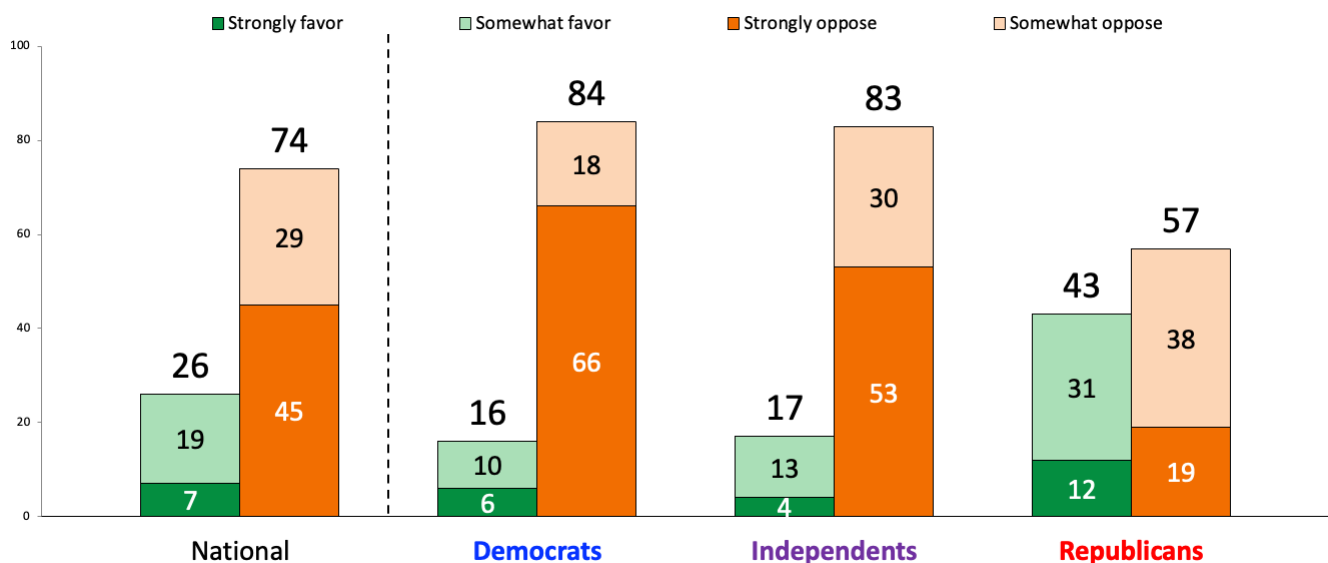

RE: Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) National Poll

The following is a summary of findings from an online survey among 1,000 registered voters nationwide who are likely to vote in the 2026 general election. These results also include an oversample of 200 voters who are men between the ages of 18 and 34 for a total of 1,200 interviews. Respondents were reached via text to web and voter file-matched online panel. The survey was conducted September 29-October 5, 2025. The sampling error for this survey is $\pm 3.1\%$. Party identification: 32% Democrat, 33% Independent, 35% Republican.

The Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) is universally popular with more than four in five (82%) favoring the law, including 17% who strongly favor TSCA. Support for TSCA is consistent regardless of gender, age, race, or education level. TSCA favorability is strong across partisan lines as well, with 78% of Democrats, 81% of Independents, and 86% of Republicans favoring it. It is important to note that voters support TSCA with no definition provided, simply based on the name.

Given the strong base level of support, it is no wonder that the overwhelming majority of voters (74%) oppose the proposed changes to TSCA with nearly half (45%) **strongly** opposing. A majority of all partisan groups opposes the changes to TSCA (see Figure below). More than eight in ten Democrats and Independents (84% and 83%, respectively) oppose the changes, as well as the majority (57%) of Republicans.

"The Trump Administration is proposing changes to the TSCA. These changes will allow chemicals to come on the market with shorter review times and with the assumption that chemicals are safe until proven harmful. After hearing that, do you favor or oppose the proposed changes to the Toxic Substances Control Act or the TSCA?"



Among men under age 35, the majority of whom (56%) supported Donald Trump in 2024, opposition to changes to the TSCA is still strong, with two thirds (65%) opposing changes including 35% who strongly oppose the changes.
